the million dollar hip hop challenge a battle for rhyme supremacy goes beyond the cliché of creating a list of the greatest rappers of all time instead rap veterans kool rock of the fat boys and sean xlg propose an actual skills challenge to determine the real go a t the competition centers on categories of rhyme styles on a variety of subjects to test a rapper's true level of skills with a panel of qualified judges to critique their work and rate their overall ability one million dollars is on the line and winner takes all

how realistic is it to expect translation to render the world intelligible in a context shaped by different historical trajectories and experiences can we rely on human universals to translate through the unique and specific webs of meaning that languages represent if knowledge production is a kind of translation then it is fair to assume that

the possibility of translation has largely rested on the idea that western experience is the repository of these human universals against the background of which different human experiences can be rendered intelligible the problem with this assumption however is that there are limits to western claims to universalism mainly because these claims were at the service of the desire to justify imperial expansion this book addresses issues arising from these claims to universalism in the process of producing knowledge about diverse african social realities it shows that the idea of knowledge production as translation can be usefully deployed to inquire into how knowledge of africa translates into an imperial attempt at changing local norms institutions and spiritual values translation in this sense is the normalization of meanings issuing from a local historical experience claiming to be universal the task of producing knowledge of african social realities cannot be adequately addressed without a prior critical engagement with how translation has come to shape our ways of rendering africa intelligible

underground rap is largely a subversive grassroots and revolutionary movement in underground hip hop tending to privilege creative freedom as well as progressive and liberating thoughts and actions this book contends that many practitioners of underground rap have absorbed religious traditions and ideas and implement critique or abandon them in their writings this in turn creates processural mutations of god that coincide with and speak to the particular context from which they originate utilising the work of scholars like monica miller and alfred north whitehead gill uses a secular religious methodology to put forward an aesthetic philosophy of religion for the rap portion of underground hip hop drawing from whiteheadian process thought a theopoetic argument is made namely that it is not simply the case that is god the poet of the world but rather rap can in fact be the poet creator of its own form of quasi religion this is a unique look at the religious workings and implications of underground rap and hip hop as such it will be of keen interest to scholars of religious studies hip hop studies and process philosophy and theology

shamanism racism and hip hop culture is a groundbreaking collection of essays exploring the five hundred year history of white christian hegemony that has so profoundly shaped american society james w perkinson explores the idea that american identity and history are profoundly informed by an on going interweaving of white entitlement and black disenfranchisement that constrains other forms of cultural struggle

composition and hip hop may seem unrelated but the connection isn t hard to make hip hop and rap rely on a complex of narrative practices that have clear ties to some of the best american essay writing a hip hop reader brings together work about this cultural phenomenon and provides selections that represent a variety of styles and interests

in his first major book on the state of black america since the new york times bestseller losing the race john mcwhorter argues that a renewed commitment to achievement and integration is the only cure for the crisis in the african american community winning the race examines the roots of the serious problems facing black americans today poverty drugs and high incarceration rates and contends that none of the commonly accepted reasons can explain the decline of black communities since the end of segregation in the 1960s instead mcwhorter posits that a sense of victimhood and alienation that came to the fore during the civil rights era has persisted to the present day in black culture even though most blacks today have never experienced the racism of the segregation era mcwhorter traces the effects of this disempowering conception of black identity from the validation of living permanently on welfare to gansta rap s glorification of irresponsibility and violence as a means of protest he discusses particularly specious claims of racism attacks the destructive posturing of black leaders and the hip hop academics and laments that a successful black person must be faced with charges of acting white while acknowledging that racism still exists in america today mcwhorter argues that both

blacks and whites must move past blaming racism for every challenge blacks face and outlines the steps necessary for improving the future of black america

hip hop s inheritance arguably offers the first book length treatment of what hip hop culture has literally inherited from the harlem renaissance the black arts movement the feminist art movement and 1980s and 1990s postmodern aesthetics by comparing and contrasting the major motifs of the aforementioned cultural aesthetic traditions with those of hip hop culture all the while critically exploring the origins and evolution of black popular culture from antebellum america through to obama s america hip hop s inheritance demonstrates that the hip hop generation is not the first generation of young black and white folk preoccupied with spirituality and sexuality race and religion entertainment and athletics or ghetto culture and bourgeois culture taking interdisciplinarity and intersectionality seriously hip hop s inheritance employs the epistemologies and methodologies from a wide range of academic and organic intellectual activist communities in its efforts to advance an intellectual history and critical theory of hip hop culture drawing from academic and organic intellectual activist communities as diverse as african american studies and women s studies postcolonial studies and sexuality studies history and philosophy politics and economics and sociology and ethnomusicology hip hop s inheritance calls into question one dimensional and monodisciplinary interpretations or rather misinterpretations of a multidimensional and multivalent form of popular culture that has increasingly come to include cultural criticism social commentary and political analysis

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
