preoccupied hopper 1882 1967 throughout his life walter wells presents many new insights especially into the haunting silence and loneliness at the heart of the artist's vision in particular silent theater explores the psychological tensions underlying the world of hopper and his wife josephine nivison using literature and other sources the author reveals how hopper created complex pictorial dramas about the human condition the book's expansive design allows the superb reproductions of hopper's paintings watercolours and etchings including his most memorable images that have indeed become american icons to register with an impact that matches the eloquence of its text

this is the first full length biography of the american artist arthur b davies who played a major role in twentieth century american art's coming of age it was davies who made possible the landmark exhibitions of the eight and the rockwell kent independent and in 1913 he emerged as the mastermind behind the armory show the first large scale display of european modern art in the united states dozens of the country's best known collectors purchased their initial avant garde acquisitions at this show and u s artists in turn could no longer be kept in check by the conservative national academy after viewing works by duchamp matisse picasso and others drawing on extensive archival research including previously unavailable letters and diaries this book covers the breadth and depth of the artist's life and career from his boyhood in utica in the 1860s through his close association with such artists and collectors as robert henri john sloan alfred stieglitz lizzie bliss and abby aldrich rockefeller to his death in italy in 1928 in the company of his mistress with whom he had lived a secret double life as david a owen for more than twenty years included are 101 color and black and white illustrations of davies's own work ranging from romantic dream visions to fragmented cubist forms as well as photographs depicting his family and friends davies who worked in over twenty different media was called one of the foremost artists in this country and one of the greatest artists of our time and his work is represented in major collections throughout the united states the illustrations alone many of works in private collections and available here to the public for the first time as well as the appended chronology exhibition checklist and list of addresses make this a valuable addition to the library of every art dealer curator and student of american art but equally fascinating is the story of the forces personalities and relationships that helped shape the course of twentieth century american art

henry james criticized the impressionism which was revolutionizing french painting and french fiction and satirized the british aesthetic movement which championed impressionist criticism yet time and again he used the word impression to represent the most intense moments of consciousness of his characters as well as the work of the literary artist henry james and the art of impressions argues that the literary art of the impression as james practised it places his work within the wider cultural history of impressionism henry james and the art of impressions offers an unprecedentedly detailed cultural and intellectual history of the impression it draws on philosophy psychology literature critical theory intellectual influences and aesthetics to study james's early art criticism literary criticism travel writing prefaces and the three great novels of his major phase the ambassadors the wings of the dove and the golden bowl it argues that the coherent philosophical meanings of the jamesian impression emerge when they are comprehended as a family of related ideas about perception imagination and aesthetics bound together by james's

attempt to reconcile the novel's value as a mimetic form and its value as a transformative creative activity. Before the publication of her seminal essay on feminism in art, why have there been no great women artists? She had already firmly established herself as a major practitioner of a politically sophisticated and class-conscious social art history. Nochlin was part of an important cohort of scholars writing on modernity, determined to rethink the narratives of the subject under the pressure of contemporary events such as student uprisings, the women's liberation movement, and the Vietnam War. With the help of politically engaged literary criticism that was emerging at the same time, Nochlin embraced Charles Baudelaire's conviction that modernity is meant to be of one's time and that the role of an art historian was to understand the art of the past not only in its own historical context but according to the urgencies of the contemporary world from

academic debates about the nude in the eighteenth century to the work of robert gober in the twenty first whatever she turned her analytic eye to was conceived as the art of the now including seven previously unpublished pieces this collection highlights the breadth and diversity of nochlin s output across the decades including discussions on colonialism fashion and sex

the first major english language biography of francisco goya y lucientes who ushered in the modern era the life of francisco goya 1746 1828 coincided with an age of transformation in spanish history that brought upheavals in the country s politics and at the court which goya served changes in society the devastation of the iberian peninsula in the war against napoleon and an ensuing period of political instability in this revelatory biography janis tomlinson draws on a wide range of documents including letters court papers and a sketchbook used by goya in the early years of his career to provide a nuanced portrait of a complex and multifaceted painter and printmaker whose art is synonymous with compelling images of the people events and social revolution that defined his life and era tomlinson challenges the popular image of the artist as an isolated figure obsessed with darkness and death showing how goya s likeability and ambition contributed to his success at court and offering new perspectives on his youth rich family life extensive travels and lifelong friendships she explores the full breadth of his imagery from scenes inspired by life in madrid to visions of worlds without reason from royal portraits to the atrocities of war she sheds light on the artist s personal trials including the deaths of six children and the onset of deafness in middle age but also reconsiders the conventional interpretation of goya s late years as a period of disillusion viewing them instead as years of liberated artistic invention most famously in the murals on the walls of his country house popularly known as the black paintings a monumental achievement goya a portrait of the artist is the definitive biography of an artist whose faith in his art and his genius inspired paintings drawings prints and frescoes that continue to captivate challenge and surprise us two centuries later

the art of life according to john kekes consists in living a life of personal and moral excellence this art requires continuous creative effort drawing on one s character circumstances experiences and ideals

from t j clark comes this provocative study of the origins of modern art in the painting of parisian life by edouard manet and his followers the paris of the 1860s and 1870s was a brand new city recently adorned with boulevards cafes parks great exhibitions and suburban pleasure grounds the birthplace of the habits of commerce and leisure that we ourselves know as modern life a new kind of culture quickly developed in this remade metropolis sights and spectacles avidly appropriated by a

new kind of consumer clerks and shopgirls neither working class nor bourgeois inventing their own social position in a system profoundly altered by their very existence emancipated and rootless these men and women flocked to the bars and nightclubs of paris went boating on the seine at argenteuil strolled the island of la grande jatte enacting a charade of community that was to be captured and scrutinized by manet degas and seurat it is clark s cogently argued and profusely illustrated thesis that modern art emerged from these painters attempts to represent this new city and its inhabitants concentrating on three of manet s greatest works and seurat s masterpiece clark traces the appearance and development of the artists favorite themes and subjects and the technical innovations that they employed to depict a way of life which under its liberated pleasure seeking surface was often awkward and anxious through their paintings manet and the impressionists ask us and force us to ask ourselves is the freedom offered by modernity a myth is modern life heroic or monotonous glittering or tawdry spectacular or dull the painting of modern life illuminates for us the ways both forceful and subtle in which manet and his followers raised these questions and doubts which are as valid for our time as for the age they portrayed

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
