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the desire for our children to be free from want and danger and to be able to enjoy their youth in innocence would seem to be universal conventional wisdom says that parents in every socio economic level of society share the dream of preserving their children s innocence all want to provide a childhood and adolescence that shelters and protects children from the harshness of life and nurtures them until they are able to withstand the onslaught of reality one need only look at troubled areas of the world such as northern ireland parts of the middle east or any number of other points on the globe to see how weak is any communion forged out of these universal desires for the welfare of children even in the united states the competition of ideas and values about what represents the good society in which to raise our children is fierce as are differing views about the value of innocence and even life itself these differing ideas and values affect people s actions even when they have never reflected on them or have never cared enough to formulate those values into a coherent worldview crouse contends that without morals children are at risk moral boundaries not moral relativism provide a safe haven for children by preserving their innocence and protecting them from predators and pedophiles when authentic religious faith has been quashed children are no longer safe when the underlying values are wrong when there are no common values unifying a people even the best programs and most honorable of intentions are doomed to failure well intentioned programs and policies inevitably fail miserably without an undergirding moral foundation as is documented by an abundance of data and the social trends in america today

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this book explores the circumstances of at risk students and argues that well intentioned policymakers and educators run the risk of making matters worse rather than better for these students even if their actions are based on the best social science evidence available the book demonstrates the diverse idiosyncratic nature of these students argues that traditional social science methods cannot capture this idiosyncrasy and diversity and presents research methods policies and programs that can accommodate student

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abstract this document is an american association of school administrators critical issues report on youth at risk the report begins with a discussion of why students are at risk and includes issues related to poverty school ethnicity race family and the student himself the next section describes action that is being taken through businesses government and schools other resources are also listed following this the author examines strategies to identify youth at risk and implement programs specific school based programs are described followed by strategies that focus on teen pregnancy substance abuse and suicide last the author provides four approaches for coping with youth at risk alternative curriculum counseling tutoring and work related business partnerships

this report presents findings of an inquiry into the educational needs of children prenatally exposed to drugs and covers 1 the extent of the problem 2 negative effects of prenatal drug exposure on a child s educational potential 3 typical behaviors and learning deficits of such children and 4 characteristics of successful early childhood programs for this population the report also contains profiles of eight programs specifically designed to educate children prenatally exposed to drugs or experiencing psychosocial traumas programs are located in the district of columbia los angeles california st petersburg florida tampa florida new york city chicago illinois and palo alto california highlights of the review of the four study questions include the number of children prenatally exposed to illicit drugs is increasing the prevalent use of alcohol and cigarettes poses a greater prenatal threat to a larger number of babies than does any illicit drug 30 40 percent of prenatally drug exposed children display developmental delays in the absence of effective early intervention there is no profile of behavior and learning typical of drug exposed children educators should focus on identifying and addressing the problem behaviors not on the causes and successful programs use developmentally appropriate practice standards and not new instructional methodology especially for drug exposed children recommendations a list of 32 programmatic or organizational resources and a glossary complete the report contains approximately 132 references db
