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for a few years in the mid 1990s a small music label called death row stood atop the hip hop world death row records was instrumental in introducing a hard core style of rap music known as gangsta rap to mainstream audiences albums like dr dre s the chronic snoop doggy dogg s doggystyle and tupac shakur s all eyez on me sold millions of copies and influenced a new generation of artists the money rolled in for death row s founder marion suge knight the good times could not last however tupac was murdered suge knight was sent to prison for various crimes and the label s top stars moved on the dramatic rise and fall of death row records is chronicled in this book

death row records exploded onto the rap scene in 1993 with top stars such as dr dre and snoop doggy dogg and sales climbing

to the 125 million mark in just four years at the heart of the label however was a ferocious criminal enterprise hiding behind corporate facades that gave it a guise of legitimacy in this expose the country's preeminent rap journalist gives readers the facts behind the record company that everyone else has been afraid to divulge

author jake brown has woven a tale of intense drama that paved the way for some of the world's biggest stars including tupac shakur dr dre and snoop dog the suge knight and death row story details the visionary entrepreneur's life story encompassing his meteoric rise to the top of the charts after partnering with dre to found death row records it tells you where suge intends to take hip hop in the new millennium and features insightful interviews with business associates family members and artists who speak candidly about his life

of an era's worst racial stereotypes rather he positions the works of key gangsta rap artists as well as the controversies their work produced squarely within the law and order politics and popular culture of the 1980s and 1990s to reveal a profoundly complex period in American history when the meanings of crime and criminality were incredibly unstable at the center of this era when politicians sought to prove their tough on crime credentials was the mark of criminality a set of discourses that labeled members of predominantly poor urban and minority communities as threats to the social order through their use of the mark of criminality public figures implemented extremely harsh penal policies that have helped make the United States the world's leading jailer of its adult population at the same time when politicians like Ronald Reagan George H. W. Bush and Bill Clinton and television shows such as *Cops* and *America's Most Wanted* perpetuated images of gang and drug-filled ghettos gangsta rap burst out of the hip-hop nation emanating mainly from the predominantly black neighborhoods of South Central Los Angeles groups like N.W.A. and solo artists including Dr. Dre Snoop Dogg and Tupac Shakur became millionaires by marketing the very discourses political and cultural leaders used to justify their war on crime for these artists the mark of criminality was a source of power credibility and revenue by understanding gangsta rap as a potent if deeply imperfect enactment of the mark of criminality we can better understand how crime is always a site of struggle over meaning furthermore by underscoring the nimble rhetorical character of criminality we can learn lessons that may inform efforts to challenge our nation's failed policies of mass incarceration
