during the first quarter of the twenty first century more than one hundred institutions of higher education in the united states launched projects to study and share their histories concerning slavery segregation and racial injustice slavery segregation and the second founding of rice university joins these wider efforts authored by award winning historians

alexander x byrd and w caleb mcdaniel the book engages questions specific to rice s history as the last major private research university in the country to begin desegregation although rice did not open its doors for classes until 1912 it was connected to the history of slavery through the life of its first founder and namesake william marsh rice whose fortune was deeply intertwined with the enslavement of black people byrd and mcdaniel place the history of one of the nation s most renowned universities within a longer and larger context showing that desegregation required changes to rice so fundamental that they amounted to a second founding of the school following the story from slavery through segregation to the second founding they highlight pivotal points of intersection between the history of black houston and the history of rice university revealing the seldom acknowledged roles of black students black communities and hbcus in creating change at and around rice their study challenges readers to consider anew who counts as a university s founder a question relevant to ongoing discussions about statues naming and the history of higher education they also reveal what higher education institutions do at their best create new knowledge and forge solutions to trenchant social problems thus providing guidance for those committed to doing the valuable work of the second founding at colleges and universities today

keith m finley s from slavery to segregation explores the key features shaping southern politics during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries as explained in the south s defense of its racial systems it treats slavery and segregation as part of the same whole rather than as discrete institutions rooted in different periods in the process the book uncovers the deep historical origins of the region s states rights philosophy and the unfortunate persistence of a culture dominated by calls for white supremacy while highlighting the broad overview of southern racial and political thought finley underscores the larger american struggle with racial injustice which although most pronounced in the south afflicted the entire nation the south s defense of chattel slavery became a natural model for the region s defense of segregation during the jim crow era through a comparative analysis of the rhetoric employed in the justification of both racial institutions finley reveals elements of continuity and change in the region s identity ultimately he shows how the history of the twentieth century south is irreparably linked to the century before it for instance one cannot understand the ferocity of resistance to the supreme court s 1954 brown v board decision without being aware of how and why the south emerged as it did after the civil war the old south and the new south shared a similar constellation of ideas that informed arguments advancing their respective race based social orders which took the form of a commonality of perception regarding race a sense of being assailed by outsiders and a series of appeals to the highest secular authority in the

pantheon of regional and american beliefs the constitution discontinuity however marked the long term strategies of both the prewar and postwar south although segregationists sought to preserve the racial status quo as did their forebears they ultimately relented when confronted with federal power and grudgingly shifted toward a narrative that less often foregrounded race when championing states rights

singing through struggle music worship and identity in postemancipation black churches offers an innovative look at the vital role music and worship played in nurturing black citizenship and identity during the reconstruction era in such border cities as baltimore washington dc and philadelphia the church was where newly emancipated migrants and members of the free black community merged identities priorities and experiences through a process of cultural negotiation music as a sign of black achievement and as a genuine expression of identity produced both bastions and battlegrounds in the fight for democracy the music of black churchgoers singing together in sanctuaries as well as in homes schools and outdoors expressed resistance to uplift ideologies within and to white supremacy without even while using hymns and music of the european sacred tradition members infused the songs they chose with new meanings relevant to their evolving concerns and situations drawing on fresh archival sources singing through struggle sheds light on the unexplored gap in the study of african american religious music between slavery and the great migration demonstrating the continuous stream of black creativity and dignity that existed in religious music making between gospel music and the spirituals this close up investigation of three black congregations draws out previously forgotten stories of men and women who understood church music as key to shaping a collective purpose and civic identity their stories demonstrate how faith music and ritual gave the black community means for exploring a deeply complex and ever changing reality
